News from Denise Colbert

(Chief Operating Officer, Free UK Genealogy CIO)

Hello everyone,

In my last update for Q1, I shared news of FreeComETT, the development of FreeBMD2, and the launch of FreePRO, as well as our plans for the October Strategy Weekend. Over the past few months, we've been building on that progress and laying important foundations for the future.

FreePRO (FreePROBATE) is really starting to take form. The technical team have now received a larger sample of the Probate book images and are using these to refine the technical framework and shape the editorial processes. It's early days, but exciting to see this project moving from idea into reality.

Alongside this, we've been busy preparing on the fundraising side: we're once again taking part in the **Big Give Christmas Challenge** with an ambitious target of raising £40,000 to fund the full digitisation of the Probate books. To unlock match funding, we need to secure £10,000 in pledges by 5 September. At the time of writing, we've already reached £6,600 in pledges (beating our previous record of £5,000 in 2022!). FreeBMD2 is now in its final stages, with the team making refinements based on user feedback ahead of launch in the coming weeks — watch this space!

Meanwhile, we're also tackling **financial sustainability on FreeBMD** itself, reviewing advertising placements to balance revenue needs with user experience.

FreeCEN and **FreeREG** continue to grow steadily thanks to your contributions. We're also exploring how best to support volunteers who may want to take on new responsibilities, including the idea of a dedicated **online volunteer hub** to bring our global community together.

You may remember I introduced **FreeComETT** in my last update — our new online transcription tool for FreeREG volunteers. Development has continued in the background this quarter, and while there's not much to announce just yet, it remains a key project for us. FreeComETT will make transcription more accessible and user-friendly, and will play an important role in supporting volunteers now and in the future.

Finally, planning is well underway for the **Strategy Weekend (4–5 October, Birmingham and online)**. Building on the pillars of *Quality, Value, and Growth* set in 2023, the weekend will be a chance to hear project updates, explore how we can strengthen our volunteer community, and discuss how to keep quality at the heart of all we do. I hope many of you will be able to join us, whether in person or virtually.

We have the following vacancies at present:

Hereford

County has been inactive for a while so no active transcribers at this time. One year is fully transcribed with some pieces from other years also complete. We do have scans we can supply you with.

Nottingham

County has five years fully transcribed, with a sixth only needing a few pieces proofread before that one is complete. There are a small number of transcribers working on the remaining two years. We do have scans we can supply you with.

Sussex

County has no coordinator at present, and has been vacant for a while, so no active transcribers at this time. Three years are fully transcribed, with another close to it. Some of the uploaded pieces however do need re-validating (but we may already have someone to do these re-validations). We do have scans we can supply you with.

Interesting People – Walter Harsant

Little is known of his early life other than to say that he received several diplomas, most distinguished by that obtained from the “Royal College of Surgeons” in London.

These diplomas were put to good use as soon after the 1851 Census Walter emigrated to New Zealand where he became the “Government Factotum” in the Te Awamutu and Raglan districts between 1854 and 1878.

Interesting People – Whitwell Elwin

The 1851 census for Norfolk in the town of Reepham (piece HO107_1810) includes one Whitwell ELWIN, and his family as seen below:

While the entry itself suggests he is simply the rector of a local parish, research has revealed that he was an associate of John MURRAY, publisher to Charles DARWIN and was consulted regularly by John about Charles's works.

The [Friends of Darwin website sums up Whitwell](#) as follows:

“Elwin was a clergyman, and a close associate of Darwin’s publisher, John Murray, whom Murray consulted regarding most of his new publications. Murray sent a manuscript of Origin to Elwin for comment prior to publication. In a long [letter to Murray](#) on 3rd May 1859, Elwin praised the style and breadth of Darwin’s valuable work, but claimed that Darwin’s lack of evidence “would do grievous injustice to his views”. Instead of rushing into print with the full volume at this time, said Elwin, why not take up Sir Charles Lyell’s earlier suggestion and write a shorter book about Darwin’s observations on pigeons?”

How Do You Spell That Place Name

Spellings of some place names are as clear as black and white, there is only the one right answer. Then there are those where variations of the name exist. And we have those that some of us could easily debate, but not necessarily be able to back up.

Currently I am working on validations of Yorkshire, and there are place names which are easy to spell, Leeds, and York just to name two. There is just the one way to spell these two, and I think we can all agree on these ones without much discussion. Other place names will be the same in that there is just the one acceptable way to spell them.

Moving on to one that has been debated is that of Gloster, shortened from Gloucester. Seen on a good number of pieces, found in documents from other sources, even BMD refer to Gloster as a valid district in a number of quarters. A check of the [FreeBMD website](#) confirms this, same website page show variations for a number of other districts, Glandford Brigg appearing just a few entries above the Gloucester listing is a good sample. Question is, is Gloster a valid alternative name for Gloucester. As much as I would like to use Gloster as is, a quick search suggests that there is nothing official to back this up, and that means, if Gloster does appear as a place of birth, then the correct thing to do is to add to the entry the alternative name of Gloucester.

A number of places are know to be shortened by people on various documents. Staying with Yorkshire, Scarborough abbreviated to Scarboro is a good example. While people will know which place Scarboro refers to, but again like Gloster, there is nothing official to back these up. As such, if Scarboro does appear as a place name on a census entry, then we should also find the correct alternative name of Scarborough added to the same entry.

And now we have those places where we have more than one valid way to spell the name. Take Aberystwyth. [GenUKI confirms this spelling](#) as seen on their map below.



However, in a recent Cardiganshire piece that I validated which is where Aberystwyth is located, there were about 800 instances of the place being spelt as Aberystwith. A search for Aberystwith did show a number of sources where this variation is used. One such example is that of the ["Aberystwith and Welsh Coast Railway" \(details on Wikipedia\)](#) which established a railway line between Aberystwyth and Pwllheli. Various government legislations for the railway have Aberystwith as part of the act's name.

With places like Aberystwyth, as we can back up Aberystwith as being a valid name of the place, then our Gazetteer will accept both variations. Another good Welsh example is that of Llangamarch in the county of Brecon, for which [GenUKI also gives Llangammarch](#) as a valid spelling.

A number of other places are the same, especially those of Irish, Scottish, or Welsh origin, there are various ways to spell the name, and to go with it, valid sources that will back them up.

FreeCEN1
