News from Denise Colbert

(Chief Operating Officer, Free UK Genealogy CIO)

Hello everyone,

In my last update for Q1, I shared news of FreeComETT, the development of FreeBMD2, and the launch of FreePRO, as well as our plans for the October Strategy Weekend. Over the past few months, we've been building on that progress and laying important foundations for the future.

FreePRO (FreePROBATE) is really starting to take form. The technical team have now received a larger sample of the Probate book images and are using these to refine the technical framework and shape the editorial processes. It's early days, but exciting to see this project moving from idea into reality.

Alongside this, we've been busy preparing on the fundraising side: we're once again taking part in the **Big Give Christmas Challenge** with an ambitious target of raising £40,000 to fund the full digitisation of the Probate books. To unlock match funding, we need to secure £10,000 in pledges by 5 September. At the time of writing, we've already reached £6,600 in pledges (beating our previous record of £5,000 in 2022!). If you're able and would like to contribute, you can <u>make a pledge here.</u>

If pledging isn't possible, please do consider donating during Big Give week (2–9 December), or helping by sharing our campaign posts on <u>Facebook</u> or <u>LinkedIn</u>.

FreeBMD2 is now in its final stages, with the team making refinements based on user feedback ahead of launch in the coming weeks — watch this space!

Meanwhile, we're also tackling **financial sustainability on FreeBMD** itself, reviewing advertising placements to balance revenue needs with user experience.

FreeCEN and **FreeREG** continue to grow steadily thanks to your contributions. We're also exploring how best to support volunteers who may want to take on new responsibilities, including the idea of a dedicated **online volunteer hub** to bring our global community together.

You may remember I introduced **FreeComETT** in my last update — our new online transcription tool for FreeREG volunteers. Development has continued in the background this quarter, and while there's not much to announce just yet, it remains a key project for us. FreeComETT will make transcription more accessible and user-friendly, and will play an important role in supporting volunteers now and in the future.

We have continued to build stronger foundations this quarter, and with October just around the corner, I'm looking forward to turning strategy into shared action across our community.

FreeCEN Vacancies

If you are interested in becoming one of our county coordinators, then this is for you as we have some roles that we would like to fill. Experience at transcribing and proofreading for FreeCEN is preferable. Help and support is available if needed.

We have the following vacancies at present:

Hereford

County has been inactive for a while so no active transcribers at this time. One year is fully transcribed with some pieces from other years also complete. We do have scans we can supply you with.

Nottingham

County has five years fully transcribed, with a sixth only needing a few pieces proofread before that one is complete. There are a small number of transcribers working on the remaining two years. We do have scans we can supply you with.

Sussex

County has no coordinator at present, and has been vacant for a while, so no active transcribers at this time. Three years are fully transcribed, with another close to it. Some of the uploaded pieces however do need re-validating (but we may already have someone to do these re-validations). We do have scans we can supply you with.

One Address - Multiple Households

(From Chris Mahoney)

On occasions you will come across addresses where there are indications that more than one household is at the address. Could be a private house that has taken on a lodger or two, could be a boarding house with separate families in each of the rooms. And the question that has been asked a few times recently, "What should we do with such addresses?". Enumerators of the day were given clear instructions on what to do along with various other instructions given to them at the start of many enumeration districts. Take the following for example.

any purpose. For a house in course of building a figure 1 should be inserted in

3. Under the last entry for each house draw a strong double line, as in the example on the opposite page, to separate such entries from those for the house next following; and where there are two or more occupiers in the same house, draw a single line to distinguish the separate families, as in the example. [Note—The occupier of a separate tenement, even if living alone without wife or family, must be treated as a separate family.]


Enter in the same manner the contents of all the other Schedules, in strict numerical order.

The FreeCEN handbook has the following to say about this:

"Care should be taken if the Enumerator has entered two separate families, each with its own "Head", under a single address. You will see that families are separated by an enumerators tick, either / or //. A / means a new family same address whilst // means a new family at a new address. You can therefore re-enter the address for families with an / immediately before them, but not for a // as this is a different building. Each family should be given a schedule number 0 (zero) if the enumerator has not given them a schedule number and an enumerator's tick exists."

And now for some examples of such addresses that have more than one household at the address.

Example One



In this one from 1901 we have schedule 66 for "4 Stephen Street", and schedule 68 for "3 Stephen Street" with the two addresses separated by double lines. And between schedule 66 and schedule 67 is a single line. This tells us that schedule 66, and schedule 67 is the one address, but has two separate households at the address.



In this one from 1851 we can see a thick line going across several columns before and after schedule 70 clearly showing that this is a separate schedule to that of schedule 69, and 71. Schedule 70 also shows that it has two heads of house, and has a similar thick line which only covers some of the columns. This we can interpret as that "Catherine Roberts" is the head of the first household, and that "William Rowlands" is the head of the second.

Since no schedule numbers are given for the "William Rowland" household, this one will be given a schedule number of 0 when it is transcribed.

Example Three



In this sample from 1861 we can see that there are double lines at the start of schedule 284, and again at the end of the same schedule. The schedule also shows two heads of house with an added note that the second one is a boarder. However on this occasion while it appears that there are two separate households at the address, and the double lines suggest that the enumerator has followed their instructions, there is nothing to indicate that these two households should actually be separated into two separate schedules and as such I would not separate them for this one.

Some advice that would help here, and transcribing generally, when starting a new enumeration district have a browse through it first and get a feel on how the actual enumerator recorded that district, doing so just could make the transcribing of the district easier.

Interesting Person – Norman Garstin

Garstin hailed from Ireland but made his way to Penzance and stayed. His most famous painting in Cornwall is probably 'The Rain it Raineth Every Day', a rather beautiful depiction of Penzance promenade being buffeted by wind and rain. Apparently, he donated it to the town council which initially failed to exhibit a painting that might be off-putting to tourists because of the rain. Now it is exhibited prominently in the Penlee Gallery, Penzance.
